Prepare a challenging schedule for senior year

- Meet with your counselors to determine what classes you will take next year.
 - Make sure you are on track for graduation with credits

Take the ACT or SAT

• Our office recommends taking in April or June

Gather college information (The How)

- Go to college fairs ,attend college rep visits and speak with college representatives who visit DB
- Use an online college finder to search top college lists
 - Ex. <u>Naviance</u>

Gather college information (The What):

- Entrance requirements
 - Tuition
- Room and board costs
 - Course offerings
 - Student activities
 - Financial aid

Make sure you're meeting any special requirements

- If you want to play Division I or II sports in college, start the certification process
- Check with counselor to make sure you are taking the cores that meet the NCAA requirements

Start thinking about and contacting people for your recommendation letters

 Some colleges want recommendation letters with application
 Ask teachers who know you well and will have positive things to say

Apply for summer job or internship

• Summer employment and internships in fields you're interested in will look appealing on college applications

Set up appointments at your top college choices if available

- To set these appointments up:
- Visit admissions website to contact about tours, personal interviews, etc.



Visit College

- Try and visit as many college campuses as you can
- Take a tour and speak with the admissions and financial aid staff

Organize Financial Aid Information

• Develop a plan that includes a list of aid sources, requirements for each application and timetable for meeting deadlines

Start working on your application essays

- Compose rough draft
- Have someone proofread

A+ Program

A+ Scholarship Program provides scholarships funds to eligible graduates of A+ designated high schools who attend a participating public community college or vocational/technical school, or certain private two-year vocational/technical schools

A+ Requirements

- 1. GPA minimum of 2.5 avg at graduation
- 2. Maintain at least a 95% cumulative attendance record over the 4 years
 2. 50 hours of unpoid tutoring/mentoring of other students
 - 3. 50 hours of unpaid tutoring/mentoring of other students
 4. FAFSA Completed

A+ Requirements

- 5. Good Citizenship (disqualification include: suspension from school for the use of drugs or alcohol, if involved with fights, assault or connected with a felony
 - 6. Males must register with selective services within 30 days of 18th birthday

7. US citizen or permanent resident

ACT and SAT

- 50-60% of schools are reverting to testing being mandatory
- University of Missouri system is definitely going back to test required.

Advantages

Testing puts you in line for any possible institutional scholarships

Disadvantages

If the score is too low it could impact the admission decision

FAFSA

- Determines eligibility for federal, state and institutional aid, including loans
- FAFSA addresses the varying costs at different institutions

FAFSA

- Opens: October 1st
- Update when 2023 taxes are complete
 - Closes: April 1st (for Missouri)
 - Must be completed annually
